Staying Safe in School

Getting to school and back home again

- Find an easy way to walk to school or the bus stop. Ask your parents if there is anything you should watch out for along way. Always walk with a brother, sister, neighbor, or friend.
- Don't talk to strangers, go anywhere with them, or take anything from them.
- Know your phone number and address, even your area code and zip code. If you have trouble remembering them, write them down and keep them in a safe place.



After School

- If you stay home alone for a few hours after school while your parents are at work, call and check in with them as soon as you get home. Check out the Home Alone Tips on the back page.
- Ask your parents what the rules are. Are you allowed to watch TV before you finish your homework? Or have ice cream as a snack?

In the class-room

- Most teachers have their own rules for what goes on in their classroom but there are a few other things you should remember when you're in class.
- If another kid, even a friend, asks you to do something you don't want to, don't do it.
- If you get into an argument, talk it out. Fighting will hurt you and will probably get you in trouble. It may even give you a reputation as a bully.

ARE YOUR CHILDREN HOME ALONE?

- * Are they old enough and mature enough to care for themselves?
- * Can they be trusted to go straight home after school?
- * Can they use the telephone, locks and kitchen appliances?
- * Do they follow rules and instructions well?
- * Can they handle unexpected situations without panicking?
- * Can they stay home alone without being afraid?

TEACH YOUR "HOME ALONE CHILDREN..."

- * To check in with you or a trusted neighbor immediately after arriving home.
- * How to use 9-1-1 in an emergency.
- * To know their address.
- * How to use the door and window locks and the alarm system if you have one.
- * Never let anyone into the home without their parents permission.
- * Never let a caller or someone at the door know they are home alone.

- * Have them carry a house key with them in a safe place—don't leave one under the door mat or on the window ledge.
- * How to escape in case of a fire.
- * Do not go into their home if something doesn't look right—such as an open door, broken window, strange noises from inside, etc.
- * To tell their parents if any thing unusual happened or if they are scared.
